"The LORD watches over the sojourners" (Psalm 146,9)

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1. Migration is usual – even in the Bible

- Abraham hikes with his family from pasture to pasture. Due to a famine in the land he goes to Egypt to sojourn there. (Genesis 12,10)
- The experience of slavery in Egypt and the liberation thanks to the God Jahveh leave their mark on the Israel people. (see: "Historical Credo" Dtn 26,5-10)
- Above all famines (Rut 1,1) and wars lead to migration and escape.

2. The laws for the protection of strangers in the Torah, the five book of Moses.

- 3. The Church Jesus doesn't know any strangers, for you are all one in Christ Jesus. (Gal 3,26-29).
- 4. **Who welcomes a stranger, welcomes Christ.** Who doesn't welcome a stranger, doesn't welcome Christ. (Matthew 25,31-46)

"Amen, I say to you: Amen, as you did it to one of the least of these my brothers,[f] you did it to me." (Matthew 25,40)

5. Second Vatican Council, Pastoral Constitution "Gaudium et spes", Article 66:

"The workers who come from other peoples or countries, who contribute with their work to the economical success of the people ort he land, may not be discriminated at all concerning wages and labour conditions. Everybody in the host country, namely the public bodies, must not treat them as simple resources, but have to treat them as human beings. Furthermore they should help them to move their families, get an appropriate accommodation and facilitate the integration in the social life of the host country and its population. As far as possible the workers should get work in their own home countries."
